



Senior Class Gift by Ali Essey `13: For the past two years the senior class has raised money for a senior class gift in order to show our appreciation for our time at Chabad at Dartmouth and to support the continuation of that experience for future classes. For many seniors, this is the first time they are donating their own money to a personal cause. In doing this we are attempting to instill the idea of being a lifelong donor. So far, we have been extremely successful in our outreach efforts: 70% of the seniors who attend Chabad or Chabad sponsored events have been contacted, and 100% of those contacted have either given or committed to giving by the end of the school year. Our financial goal has proven to be too low for our class: we were attempting to raise \$5,000 and already have over \$6,500 in commitments. We will be continuing our efforts throughout the year and hope to grossly surpass our original goal!

Soul Maps by Rebecca Hecht `13: A true testament to the greatness of the Tanya is its ability to connect so deeply to a group of college students in 2013. And it is a testament to how lucky we are, that we can still learn and be guided by its teachings. Soul Maps has provided an excellent introduction into these teachings. Each week we discuss with Rabbi Gray the great opportunities and unfortunate pitfalls of our state as Benonim. The Beinoni is in possession of a G-dly soul, which always follows the will of G-d, and an animal soul, which follows human desires. Caught in between the Tzadikim and the Rashim the Beinoni is in a constant state of struggle, as his two souls vie to control his actions. However, it is only because of this struggle that the Beinoni is given the extraordinary opportunity to choose to follow the G-dly soul, and turn away from the animal soul. The Tanya shows us how every single one of our decisions. from how hard we work in school to how well we eat · is a manifestation of one of these souls, and has enormous repercussion. The philosophy of the Tanya we have learnt through Soul Maps reveals not only a whole new perspective of how human beings make decisions and act, but also of how to live a better, holier life.

Chabados Israel trip this December was a smashing success. Dartmouth students, 39 of us to be precise, traveled to Israel courtesy of Mayanot and Taglit Birthright Israel. I say courtesy of+because at its core, this was a Chabad at Dartmouth trip. This isnot to diminish the role of Mayanot or Birthright. I think we were unanimously grateful for our gift+of a free trip to Israel, indeed it made our whole experience possible. That said, our experience transcended what I imagine might be the sypical+Birthright trip, and I attribute it all to the particular sense of community which brings Dartmouth students together, and the strong sense of family which Chabad at Dartmouth fosters.

Our trip began without fanfare as we met in Newark, New Jersey (of all places), several hours before our flight was due to board. After shuffling through successive lines at check in, security, and boarding, we eventually found ourselves seated among the other passengers of our El-Al flight, assigned the middle seats which El-Al couldnot allocate to paying customers. As the plane took off, many of us shut our eyes, and Chabad at Dartmouthos Birthright began its physical passage to Israel. But the real trip had yet to begin. After arriving at Ben Gurion airport, we boarded our tour bus, and at this moment truly embarked upon a journey of new connections forged with the Land of Israel, with our common Jewish identity and religion, and between each other.

Chabad has had a great influence on my four years at Dartmouth College. Rabbi and Rebbetzin Gray's home has become my home, and I will greatly miss Friday nights in the Gray household. My first Shabbat dinner in Hanover was a couple of weeks before the start of

freshmen year. I have come ever since. It has been a retreat for me amidst the constant stress that is college. Dartmouth Chabad has always had one of the highest percentages of Shabbat attendance of any Chabad on Campus in the country. It has been a treat and a pleasure to see Dartmouth Chabad grow to become the hub of Jewish activity in Hanover. This Winter term, the Chabad House has been packed, with over 50 students coming every Friday night, bearing the cold walk to dine on delicious Shabbat delicacies: challah, gefilte fish, matzo ball soup, chicken, and occasionally, prime rib. As I go on to my next journey in life, I look back fondly on those Shabbat dinners, Kabbalat Shabbats, Shabbat services, conversations, and the friends I have made that have built the core of my college experience. I remember the Sinai Scholars class—our class trip to Montreal and the discovery of drive-through Canadian kosher food. The pleasure of doing mitzvot and making the world a better place: putting on tefillin, waking up to go to Shabbat morning services, traveling with Rabbi Gray and another student to the funeral of a man ir need of a minyan in central New Hampshire, and addressing the concerns of the Jewish community across campus. In my time at Chabad I have served as Secretary and Communications Chair, Speaker's Chair, and President, serving with Coleman Shear '13. Chabad has been the capstone in my college life and no question the signature element in my life the past four years. Thanks to Rabbi and Rebbetzin Gray I have always had a home, through the ups and the downs of my life in Hanover. When my Dartmouth career traveled overseas, I always found Chabad. Working for the American Jewish Committee's San Francisco Regional Office I prayed minchah in Chabad of San Francisco's Cable Car minyan. Working for U.N. Watch in Geneva, Switzerland, I went to Shabbat and holiday dinners at Chabad of Geneva. I will never forget what Chabad has meant to me these past four years as I have tried to find my way as I enter adulthood. I am excited for the future of Chabad at Dartmouth, the younger classes are full of fantastic Chabad participants and under Rabbi and Rebbetzin Gray, Dartmouth's Chabad will continue to make a home for Dartmouth's Jewish students.

From our outstanding, if eccentric, Birthright tour guide Daniel, we learned about Israel, and more importantly why it matters to us. Alone, we would have certainly been smitten by the physical beauty and social vitality of the land; through his expert curation, a hike down to a scenic waterfall or up to a mountaintop palace became a lesson in our immediate and tangible stake in the fate of this land. Israel is our land.

Through the powerful experience of sites such as Mount Herzl cemetery, Yad Vashem, and a tiny kibbutz nestled on the edge of the Israeli-Lebanese border, we were confronted with our indelible identity as Jews. Through countless interaction with and among Jews, in a Jewish state, we experienced the joy of embracing such a wonderful trait, falling in love with the Jewish people along the way.

Under the guidance of Rabbi and Rebbetzin Gray, we were challenged to open our minds and our spirits to the essential, holy character of Israel. From an ancient mikvah in Tzfat, to a extraordinary synagogue on Masada, to the Kotel in Jerusalem and a joyous Shabbat afternoon reunion hosted by a Dartmouth alum, we learned how Jewish ritual and practice contains rich, deep meaning, and that it available to all of us should we seek to learn more.

As Dartmouth students, our shared community accelerated the creation of something distinct, an uninhibited exchange among a circle of old and new friends, which we were able to share with the several Israeli soldiers who joined us along the way. Through them, we learned about Israel, we learned about what it means to be Jewish, but most of all we learned about ourselves. It is impossible to describe the ease with which these newcomers melted into our group, and together we became a travelling family. We shared with each other, through the expert facilitation of our Birthright social director Tal, and also informally. In retrospect, the frank and open discussions shared among every configuration Dartmouth students and Israelis, be it on the bus or on the long walk from the Kotel, were the most powerful experience that we had. Through this basic interaction, the entirety of our experiences as Jews in Israel came together. I cannot speak for the particular lessons that we individually took from our trip to Israel, but I can attest to the power of the experience. Above all, it was a trip of learning, the richness of which surpassed anything that could be found in a classroom. I know we all feel better for the experience, and I thank the ceaseless efforts of Chabad at Dartmouth for making it possible.
